## Guidance on use of PPE in Social Services

Basic hygiene measures for everyone include; physical distancing, good hand hygiene, cough etiquette, regular cleaning of surfaces and frequently touched items, avoid touching face, eyes, mouth and nose.

When considering the need for PPE:

- Find out the health and possible exposure of your clients to Covid-19. If visiting them, staff could phoning ahead to ask them about this.
- Consider staff ability to maintain physical distancing and whether they might need to be in close contact with clients.

The table below sets out the PPE guidance for different scenarios.

• Note that procedures for administering first aid (e.g. disposable sterile gloves) should be followed – PPE is in addition to usual measures

- Hand hygiene refers to <u>additional</u> cleansing e.g. thorough washing before and after every interaction.
- The use of hand sanitiser or gloves are recommended only if there is no access to handwashing facilities.
- It is recognised that workers and clients may feel reassured and more able to engage if masks are worn during other interactions
- But also note that PPE can give workers and clients a false level of assurance act like you're not wearing any
- If the client has Covid-19, discuss with your local public health unit the best way to interact with the client.
- Follow the guidance on how to put on and wear PPE (e.g. don't keep touching masks).
